Health Stories

Health Stories is a 3-level series (Introductory, Low Beginning, and High Beginning) that includes reading and language activities to help adults navigate the healthcare system, live a healthy lifestyle, and recognize health issues.

Readings focus on relevant health topics, such as nutrition, allergies, injuries, medication, first aid, and food safety. Each level covers the same general topics, in the same order — perfect for multilevel classrooms.

NEWSELA SCAVENGER HUNT

Back to school! The beginning of the school year offers you an opportunity to introduce your students to what learning looks like on Newsela! Distance learning showed us that we need to intentionally teach our students how to navigate their digital learning environments, just as we do with physical environments. Introduce your students to Newsela in a fun way so when you're ready to dive into content, they're well prepared. This lesson will set you and your students up for a year of meaningful learning using Newsela, and making the most of the many features.

Lesson Overview:

Begin by introducing how you will use Newsela in your lessons this year.

- How often will you use Newsela?
- Will it be independently?
- Will students have choice in what they read?

Teach students how to log on. Once they are logged on, model finding a text, changing the level, annotations, and power words. Have students complete the scavenger hunt form.

Extension Opportunities

- Search for and read an article on a topic of your choice. Practice making annotations, exploring power words, and try the quiz.
- Objective and Intro To Newsela 5 minutes
- How to Log In to Newsela (& get logged on) 5 minutes
- Model How to find an article and use Newsela Features (5 minutes)
- Introduce Scavenger Hunt & Work Time (20 minutes)




Newsela will be an integral part of our learning this year. Explore Newsela and complete this scavenger hunt to learn and discover the many things we will do with Newsela this year!

1. Go To Newsela.com and Log In - Ask your **TUTOR** for the class link to make an account if you do not have one

To make an account use the class link that your tutor sent. When you click on the link, select "It's my first time here". You will be taken to a page which will have your tutor's name as the Teacher. (See Image to right.) Create a Newsela account using a Google account, Microsoft account, or create an account using your name, email address and password. Then, select Sign Up button.

After you Sign Up, you'll be able to go to Newsela.com and log in using your account without having to use the class link.

7.	Click the Newsela logo in the top left corner. Then from the menu, click "Video." Browse the video content on Newsela. You can always click the blue "See more." Record the title of one video you think might be interested in watching.
